

Item: 2025 Legislation of Interest

Item Summary: Below are updates on bills previously identified as legislation of interest. Additionally, HR 783, the *Sustainable Cardiopulmonary Rehabilitation Services in the Home Act*, has been added to this report. This federal legislation was given a Support position by the Executive Committee following the Board's meeting on March 13, 2025. The Board is now being asked to ratify this position.

AB 667 (Solache) - Board Position: WATCH

Title: Professions and vocations: license examinations: interpreters. Status: 5/7/25: Referred to Appropriations Suspense File.

This bill, beginning July 1, 2026, requires each licensing board within the Department of Consumer Affairs (DCA) that is not a healing arts board, to allow an applicant who cannot read, speak, or write in English to use an interpreter when taking a license examination.

AB 742 (Elhawary) - Board Position: WATCH

Title: Department of Consumer Affairs: licensing: applicants who are descendants of slaves Status: 5/7/25: Referred to Appropriations Suspense File.

This bill requires a state licensing board within the Department of Consumer Affairs (DCA) to prioritize applicants seeking licensure who are descendants of American slaves if certified by the Bureaus for Descendants of American Slavery (proposed to be established by Senate Bill 518).

AB 1434 (Rodriguez) - Board Position: WATCH

Title: Health care boards: workforce data collection Status: No action has been taken on this bill since it was introduced on 2/21/25.

Existing law requires specified boards, including the Board of Registered Nursing and the Respiratory Care Board of California, to collect certain workforce data from their respective licensees and registrants for future workforce planning at least biennially. This bill would make non-substantive changes to those provisions.

SB 389 (Ochoa Bogh) - Board Position: WATCH

Title: Pupil health: individuals with exceptional needs: specialized physical health care services Status: 5/15/25: In Assembly, pending assignment.

This bill clarifies that a licensed vocational nurse performing suctioning and other basic respiratory tasks and services under the supervision of a credentialed school nurse is not prohibited under the Respiratory Care Practice Act.

SB 470 (Laird) - Board Position: WATCH

Title: Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act: teleconferencing.

Status: 5/20/25: Ordered to Senate Third Reading.

This bill extends the January 1, 2026, repeal date for certain provisions in the Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act (Bagley-Keene) until January 1, 2030, authorizing and specifying conditions under which a state body may hold a meeting by teleconference, as specified.

SB 669 (McGuire) - Board Position: WATCH

Title: Rural hospitals: standby perinatal medical services.

Status: 5/23/25: Set for Hearing in Senate Appropriations.

The bill would require the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) to establish a five-year pilot project to allow critical access and individual and small system rural hospitals to establish standby perinatal medical services.

FEDERAL LEGISLATION

HR 783 (Congressman John Joyce) - Position To Be Ratified: SUPPORT

Title: The Sustainable Cardiopulmonary Rehabilitation Services in the Home Act

Status: 1/28/25: Introduced in the House of Representatives and referred to relevant committees for consideration

The Sustainable Cardiopulmonary Rehabilitation Services in the Home Act is a Federal bipartisan legislative effort aimed at permanently expanding Medicare coverage for in-home cardiac and pulmonary rehabilitation services delivered via telehealth. This initiative builds upon temporary flexibilities introduced during the COVID-19 pandemic, which allowed patients to receive these essential services remotely.

During the pandemic, temporary waivers demonstrated the effectiveness of home-based rehabilitation services, leading to improved patient outcomes and increased access to care. Recognizing these benefits, the Act aims to make such services a permanent fixture in Medicare. It has garnered support from various healthcare organizations, including the American Association of Cardiovascular and Pulmonary Rehabilitation, the American College of Cardiology, and the American Thoracic Society.

A letter of support from the Board was sent on 4/2/2025.

SENATE BILL

No. 389

Introduced by Senator Ochoa Bogh (Coauthor: Senator Dahle)

February 14, 2025

An act to amend Section 3765 of the Business and Professions Code, and to amend Section 49423.5 of the Education Code, relating to pupil health.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 389, as amended, Ochoa Bogh. Pupil health: individuals with exceptional needs: specialized physical health care services. *respiratory services: licensed vocational nurses*.

(1) Existing law, the Respiratory Care Practice Act, establishes the Respiratory Care Board of California to license and regulate the practice of respiratory care. The act authorizes, among other things, a licensed vocational nurse who is employed by a home health agency to perform respiratory tasks and services identified by the board, as specified.

This bill would also authorize the performance of suctioning and other basic respiratory tasks and services by a licensed vocational nurse under the supervision of a credentialed school nurse.

Existing

(2) Existing law authorizes an individual with exceptional needs who requires specialized physical health care services, as defined, during the regular schoolday, to be assisted by individuals meeting specified requirements.

This bill would authorize, notwithstanding any other law, a licensed vocational nurse under the supervision of a credentialed school nurse

who meets the above-described requirements to perform specialized

physical health care services. This bill would also authorize an individual with exceptional needs who requires specialized physical health care services to be assisted

by a licensed vocational nurse under the supervision of a credentialed school nurse for the above-described basic respiratory services.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: no-yes. State-mandated local program: no.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 3765 of the Business and Professions
 Code is amended to read:

3 3765. This act does not prohibit any of the following activities:

4 (a) The performance of respiratory care that is an integral part 5 of the program of study by students enrolled in approved 6 respiratory therapy training programs.

7 (b) Self-care by the patient or the gratuitous care by a friend or
8 member of the family who does not represent or hold themselves

(e) Temporary performance, by other health care personnel,
students, or groups, of respiratory care services, as identified and
authorized by the board, in the event of an epidemic, pandemic,
public disaster, or emergency.

(g) Formally trained licensees and staff of child day care

organization identified by the board.
